

“Does Money Grow on Trees?”



When I was growing up, I often heard the saying, “Money doesn’t grow on trees.” My mother was a librarian, and my dad was a social worker and part-time cantor. Maybe our modest means fertilized the soil where sayings like that take root and grow. And, of course, the evidence seemed incontrovertible: There were no trees on which money grew. The saying seemed true to me.

That was then.

What about now? I ask the question again: Does money grow on trees? It seems to me, now, that it depends on what kind of tree. I’ll explain what I mean in a moment. In the meantime, please bear with me.

As you may recall, last year we transitioned away from a traditional Kol Nidre Appeal. Our Temple Solel Board voted unanimously to no longer make a pitch for money on the holiest night of the year. Instead, we held our first Annual Campaign and it was a success. Not only did we raise more than any recent Kol Nidre Appeal, but we also had many congregants thanking us for not asking for money on Kol Nidre.

So we are, as I write this, embarking on our 2nd Annual Campaign. As we did last year, we’re asking you to step up to the best of your ability. The economic environment remains challenging. In this environment (or in any environment), we never take your generosity for granted. Am I still optimistic that our 2nd Annual Campaign will be a success? Yes. And the reason for my optimism brings me back to the answer to the question with which I started.

Experience tells me that money does grow on certain types of trees. Maybe not on the literal ones (no matter how beautiful or majestic they may be), but on certain figurative trees it may be a different story. It is the kind of tree that is planted, nourished, and cared for through the diligent and loving efforts of a community such as ours: A community that stands together in times of joy and in times of grief, and supports itself and each other in our spiritual, educational, and life-cycle needs.

A tree such as this truly is its own kind of “Tree of Life,” as our Torah is often called. It is a tree with strong roots and dense interlocking branches. I do not mean this in just abstract terms: I have seen time and time again, in practice, how this community supports its members – spiritually, emotionally, and yes, financially. Indeed, we have a special tree.

So, as we embark on our 2nd Annual Campaign, I am optimistic that we will continue to build toward a financially-strengthened future for our temple. It will, as always, take the coordinated effort of our Board, our wonderful volunteers, and all of us as members who care about the financial health of our community.

Last year at this time, we also provided you with some answers to questions that are commonly asked with respect to campaigns such as these. We have, again, included that Q & A here in this Pathfinder. We hope that it will help clarify the unique importance of this campaign.

I am so glad to be a leaf on the tree that figuratively represents our wonderful community. Thank you and Shana Tova to all of you!

As we begin the month of Elul, we begin once again the process of introspection and self-examination that culminates in the High Holidays. We are encouraged to take stock of how we have lived our lives in the year gone by and to make amends with those around us

whom we may have sinned against in some way. And then through the process of *"teshuvah"* or turning inward, we resolve to do better in the year to come. I have mixed feelings about this time of year. Part of me (perhaps the jaded part) thinks "what's the point?" I made these same resolutions last year and didn't fulfill all of my own promises to myself or those closest to me. So what about this year will be any different?

But then there's another part of me that sees this process in a different way. The author Julia Cameron describes the process of creative growth as a path that circles its way up a mountain. We may see the same issues and challenges each year, but as we ascend the path, we look at them from a higher altitude and with a new perspective. I like this image, but I also view this evolution in the opposite direction. I see this development as a kind of an inward spiral. Each year, we drill down a little bit deeper into the core of who we are. This is not something we are meant to perfect in one year, or even in one lifetime. But as we dig into the essence of who we are and peel away the outer layers of defense and ego, we have the opportunity to see ourselves and our loved ones for who we truly are.

None of us is perfect. But by accepting that imperfection while still persevering and committing to the process, we are able to open our eyes to more and more of our own truths. Winston Churchill famously said, "Never, never, never give up." This saying can be applied to many different aspects of life: our careers, our families, our relationships. But it may be most pertinent to this work that we do as Jews each year. It is a symbol of our eternal optimism that we believe that through our deeds and our efforts that we can improve ourselves each year and take one step closer to God.

It is my wish for all of us that we remain open to the possibility that each one of us represents. By embracing this wisdom from our tradition, we choose to begin again, and again, and again...

A. Please keep in mind that the Annual Campaign is not an additional fundraising effort. Instead, it replaces the Kol Nidre Appeal to which so many of you have generously contributed in the past. Q. Why should I give to the Annual Campaign if I just paid my Dues?

A. Membership Dues and the Annual Campaign are distinct. Yet we, the Temple Solel Community, rely on both of these pieces to sustain and strengthen our financial health. Dues help to cover the basic operating expenses of our community, but it is only through a successful Annual Campaign that we can insure that we cover not only our basic expenses, but also provide resources to:

- Support the critical upkeep and maintenance of our facility
- Support additional assistance for our overstretched staff and clergy
- Continue to create the foundation for a rainy day fund
- Continue to pay down the balance on our outstanding debt

This is the path toward a financially strengthened future for our temple.

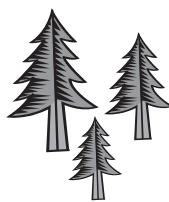

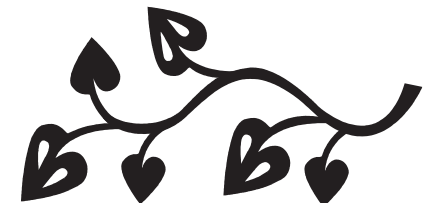

God at Temple Solel Library

One of my favorite Jewish values is the importance we place on social connection. Our tradition may teach us the ethical “No’s” of life, but it also teaches us the loving “Yes’s” of life. As excellent books in the Temple Solel library explain, Jewish learning and practice often bring us closer to family, friends, and God.

In “**The Year of Living Biblically**” (2007), A.J. Jacobs writes that Judaism developed in ancient times when the smallest unit of society was the family, not the individual. Since social cohesion offered safety and love, our ancestors developed rituals and beliefs that helped them stick together as a group and feel closer to God. Even today, Jewish life is built upon communal celebrations, group study and prayer, and tzedakah (helping others).

Likewise in “**To Life!**” (1993), Rabbi Harold Kushner says that Jewish names for God reflect the social tradition of Judaism. For example, the word “God” itself is a relational noun, like husband or sister. This word conveys the intimate relationship we share with the eternal source of life. As God tells Jacob in the Torah: “I will watch over you wherever you go... I will not let go of you” (Genesis 28:15).

Another name for God in the Torah is *Ehyeh*. According to Rabbi Kushner, the meaning of this name is revealed when God says to Moses: “I will be (*Ehyeh*) with you to help you in your struggle” (Exodus 3:12-14). *Ehyeh* represents the process of creating a loving and supportive relationship. No matter what challenges we face in life, our friends are with us and God is with us—now and forever. Please come and learn more at the Temple Solel library!

S'lichot: Preparing for the High Holy Days

The Hebrew word S'lichot means "forgiveness" and refers to special penitential prayers and liturgy recited by Jews throughout the High Holy Days. S'lichot also refers to a special service preceding Rosh Hashanah that liturgically sets out the themes of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

Many Jews begin to prepare spiritually for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur by attending temple services on S'lichot, which is considered by Abraham Millgram in his book "**Jewish Worship**" to be the "most important and most characteristic act of preparing for the Days of Awe" (p. 226).

The S'lichot service at Temple Solel begins with a beautiful silent ritual. As we prepare ourselves for the season of repentance, the mantles of the holy scrolls of Torah are changed from crimson to white. Clergy and choir also dress in traditional white robes during High Holy Day services, representing the spiritual purity to which we aspire during the process of *teshuvah* (return).

The S'lichot service offers worshipers an opportunity to prepare for the Holy Days by reflecting on our deeds of the past year and on changes we wish to make through *teshuvah*, seeking forgiveness and pardon from transgressions, turning toward our better selves.

During S'lichot services we recite prayers from the Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services that provide a transition from the old year to the new year. These ancient, familiar prayers are repeated throughout the Holy Days.

At the S'lichot service, cantor and choir introduce musical themes for this special season, including the revered Avinu Malkainu. S'lichot also introduces special traditional melodies reserved for the High Holy Days instead of melodies sung throughout the year.

The S'lichot service ends with a blast from the shofar, the ancient call to the New Year, with its opportunities for repentance and renewal.

We emerge from the S'lichot service with a sense of spiritual readiness as we approach the Days of Awe.

S'lichot is Saturday, September 24, by tradition the Saturday preceding Rosh Hashanah. A program begins at 7:00 p.m. followed by the service.

Let's prepare for the beginning of the High Holy Days by worshipping together at the S'lichot service.
